

Title: Masquerade Masque

Schedule/expected lesson time: 4-5 class periods based on 45-55 minute class times.

Grade(s)/Age(s): Adaptable for various ages. This lesson plan targets High School aged students.

Lesson Description: Inspiration for Masquerade Masque project is based upon Wearable Art by Artist Nick Cave. This project should take several sessions to complete. This will give you time to come up with a title.

Visual examples of student masques on pages 8,9,10 of this lesson plan.

Materials & Space: cast paper mask with elastic (ordered off Amazon, 50 in a bag), construction paper, tissue paper, markers and glue. You may also collect materials to enhance your project such as; paper towel roll tubes, magazines or newspaper, lightweight sticks, feathers, glitter, yarn, fabric, etc. You may use: scissors, hot glue if you have it, needle and strong thread, wire or twist ties.

Big Idea: To masquerade is to disguise oneself, or to assume the appearance of something one is not. Masquerade masks were worn by the prosperous class at masquerade balls. These masks had many uses including hiding one's identity, and using different color to express one's freedom of speech and voice one's emotions and opinions without judgement.

Essential Questions

1. Are you conveying a message, voicing an emotion or opinion?
2. Is it theatrical or based on an existing theatrical performance?
3. Will your idea be representative of an existing or fantastical creature?

Vocabulary: representational, abstract, symmetric, asymmetric, radiating, concentric, mind map, grain of paper, rhythm, masquerade.

INSTRUCTIONS: Make a plan. Give some thought to the following prompts: Will your masque be representational or abstract? Symmetric or asymmetric? Will the colors radiate from the center outward? Consider the colors you have in your package. Do you have warm or cool colors or a combination? Will you go from light to dark colors or vice versa? Will you be cutting or tearing the paper?

DAY 1

Lesson Title: Mind Map and Planning (Example on page 7 of this lesson plan)

Opener: Teacher introduces and creates a mind map for the class, while inviting students' suggestions in planning for making a mask.

Activity: Students make their own mind-map and notes of what they want their mask to look like. Students begin to prepare items such as which paper they want to use and if there are any items from home that they plan to bring in.

⇒ **Assessment Checkpoint for Objective # 1, 2**

Closer – Students share one item that they know their mask will contain.

DAY 2

Lesson Title: Explore and Prepare

Opener: Teacher demonstration of tearing paper, folding paper, rolling paper, and gluing. Teacher demonstration of how to cut, manipulate and attach toilet paper and paper towel rolls. Teacher demonstration of paper mache for those who wish to use this method. Other students will be working on their masks.

Activity: Experiment to see how you can manipulate the paper; long wispy strips, short triangular pieces, folded or curled strips, the tissue method of cutting squares and forming them to the eraser end of a pencil and gluing the flattened end to the surface (refer to images for more direction). Will you be cutting or tearing the paper? Make sure you tear with the grain of the paper, some paper will tear easily in one direction and will result in long strips while in the opposite direction the paper will zigzag without control.

You can add more sculptural elements by using paper towel tubes, making at least six cuts in one end about 2 inches long, splay the cut pieces to become the surface you will glue on.

These can be glued to the forehead, eyes, nose, mouth or chin, they can be made into horns. Have patience with the drying process. Prepare your paper while the glue is drying.

Closer: Please write down the title of your mask.

DAY 3-5

Lesson Title: Bring your Mask to Life

Opener: Teacher demonstration of sewing items to mask. Demonstration of applying tissue using the eraser end of a pencil.

Activity:

Continue to add sculptural effects such as paper mache, or sewing on various embellishments. These can be glued to the forehead, eyes, nose, mouth or chin, they can be made into horns. Have patience with the drying process. Prepare your paper while the glue is drying. Think about overall comfort of the inside of the mask against your face.

⇒ **Assessment Checkpoint for Objective #:** 1,2,3,4

Closer: Ask students if there are any major changes they would like to make at this point. If so, next class period students will be supported in making and adjusting for changes to yield more satisfactory results.

Written Assessment: Is at the end of the lesson plan for easy print out on pages 11 and 12.

Verbal Discussion/Reflection with class:

Did you have a clear imagine the final outcome ?

How close is your piece to your initial plan ?

Did it evolve as you went along ?

How far did you go beyond the edges of the mask ?

Did you find inventive ways to add sculptural elements ? Share please.

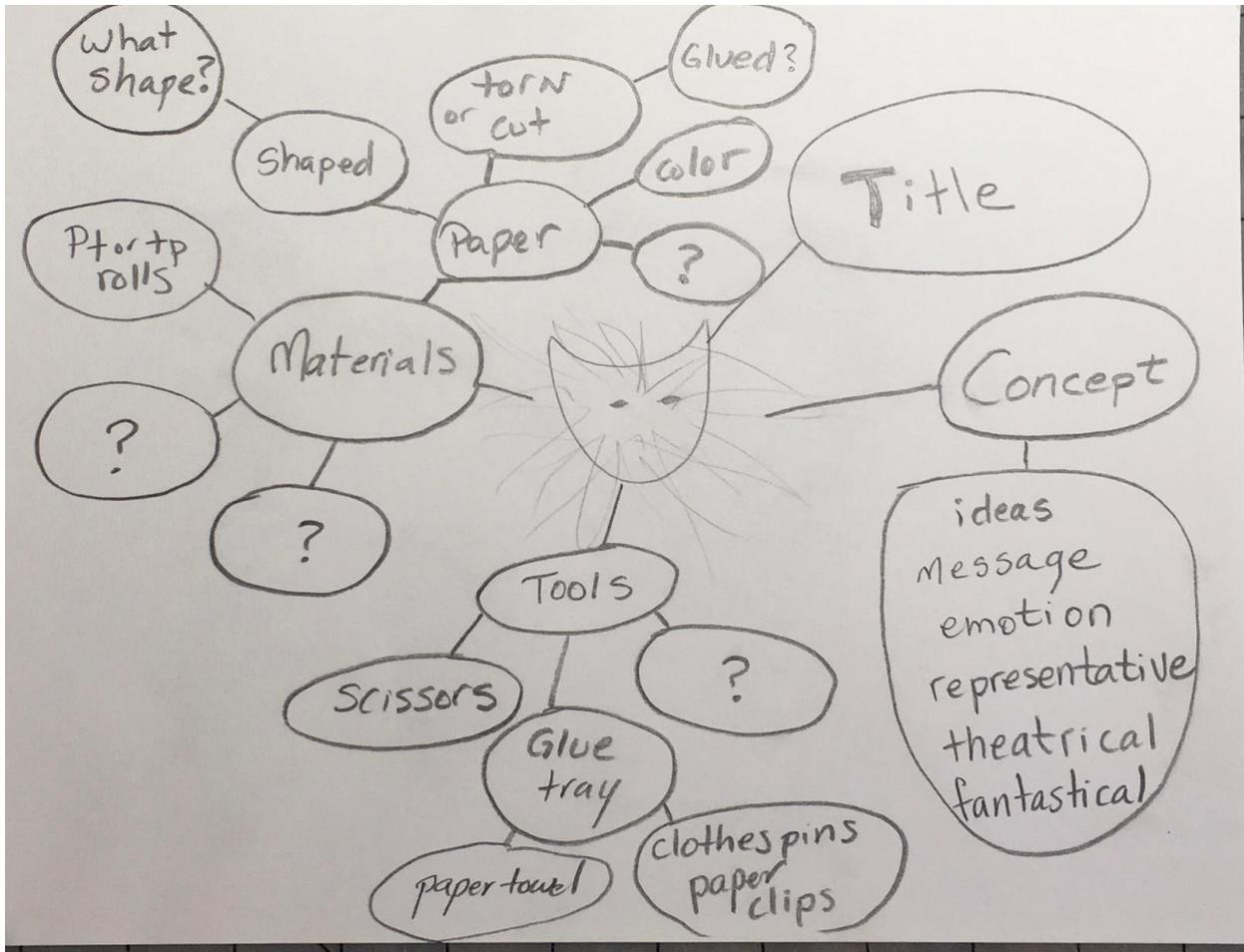
